claims for losses sustained during the late war by the
Inhabitants of the Province of Upper Canada

The Petitioner of Margaret Cameron of the Township
of Robbborough in the County of York Widow of the late
Donald Cameron deceased

Humbly sheweth -

That during the late war your petitioners horses
were prepared for the purpose of transporting artillery
from Montreal to Niagara, and that during the period
the horses were so employed, one of them was unfortunately
killed.

That your petition is in very distressing circumstances
and trusts that she will be allowed the sum of twenty
three pounds for the horse, the amount shortly before paid
by your petitioners on purchasing him, which will be
seen by the annexed affidavit, and your petition
as it duty bound will ever pray
